The ABCD's of Writing Outcomes

Outcomes are specificmeasurable statements that convey the intended priorities of a department. Outcomes should meet these criteria:

- x Meaningful: How does the outcome support the departmental mission or priorities
- x Manageable: What is needed to foster the achievement of the outcome? Is the outcome realistic?
- x Measurable: How will you know if the outcome is achieved? What is the assessment method?

Types of Outcomes


1. Program outcomes examine what a department intends achieve or accomplish for its own improvement and/or in support of institutional or divisional priorities. They are statements indicating how a department will impact the needs or satisfaction of etc.
